The Holy Name baseball team is coming off a great year that saw the Green Wave capture a division crown in the North Coast League and a district championship.

A first-round regional loss last season to Notre Dame-Cathedral Latin has Don Smith's squad more than motivated and ready to make another serious post-season run this spring.

"I think we are very strong up the middle defensively," said Smith, who begins his third year as the bench boss. "We lost some good seniors from last year's team, but feel we have a good combination of returning players and those new faces who should fit in right away."

Returning to Smith's lineup in 2008 will be senior Bryce Bartch, a three-year starter in center field and a Cleveland State University recruit. Senior Danny Green will handle the catching chores and will take his baseball talents to Walsh University next year.

Other seniors who figure prominently are Andrew Nemecek (first base), Mike Novosel (third base), Ryan Amato (pitcher), Brett Reardon (second base) and pitcher Matt Ostry. Nemecek has signed a Division II letter of intent with Wheeling Jesuit for next fall, while Novosel and Amato are four and two-year varsity players respectively. Amato will also attend Walsh University for baseball next year, while Ostry returns with two years of varsity experience.

"Ryan (Amato) is our No. 1 pitcher," said Smith. "He has a really good change-up and breaking ball. His outing was outstanding against St. Edward in the first game. Ryan went seven innings and held Ed's to just three runs. We didn't hit and wound up losing the tough game, 3-2."

Junior Kurt Babin is projected as the team's No. 2 hurler with excellent control who hits the target very well. Junior Alex Gnezda is a catcher/outfielder candidate with junior Tom McCarthy (pitcher/outfielder) and junior Trevor Smith (shortstop) figuring prominently in the Holy Name plans as well.

"Offensively, we should be pretty good at the top," noted Smith. "Brett (Reardon) will lead off for us and has good speed. Trevor (Smith) is a solid contact guy in the batter's box and will hit in the second spot in the order. Alex (Gnezda) is our power guy and will bat in the third spot with Bryce (Bartch) hitting fourth. Bryce is our main supplier of power and has the whole baseball package."

Indeed. Bartch led the team in hits and runs batted in a year ago, while Green figures to round out the heart of the batting order by hitting fifth.

"The pitching will be key," said Smith, whose ballclub recorded an overall record of 17-6 last year. "We have some depth on the mound, which we didn't have last spring. When you look at us, you should see a pretty balanced team. Now, we just have to go out on the field and get it done."

Babin sure got things done by way of a 10-0 decision over North Olmsted a couple of weeks ago. The Holy Name pitcher twirled a three-hit shutout en route to the win, while Reardon had a pair of hits and two RBIs. Green added a double to the total, while Nemecek put together a two-hit game including a two-bagger.

Holy Name fell to Trinity (11-1) earlier and will travel to Archbishop Hoban for a key North Coast League game at 4:30 p.m. today.

Watergate is a thing of the past.

The first 20 years of Columbia High football, also, has past Thank goodness for both.

Columbia compiled a 45-125 football record in its first 20 seasons for a meager .285 winning percentage. Up until 1974, the Haiders hadn't won beans, let alone many games.

BUT, THINGS have changed. In 1974, nine victories. Last year, seven more. This year, Columbia's first championship?

It's possible. For the third straight year, the Raiders are legitimate Inland Conference title contenders. And if Columbia DOES win its first league crown, it'll be coach Rick Kunkle's first one, too. This is Kunkle's initial high school head coaching test.

"I'm new to coaching in this area, but our coaches seem to think that Buckeye and Firelands will be the teams we'll have to beat," Kunkle said during yesteday's morning workouts.

"We have 12 good seniors, excellent leadership and fine strength in the offensive backfield," he said. "But the biggest question is how quickly the kids will adjust to a new sys-

Last year, Columbia ran the Power-I offense and used a 6-2 defense.

Under the new head coach Kunkle, the Raiders will shift with a two light end attack, while going with a 5-3 defense. "WE LACK depth and speed, but we have size," Kunkle said. "Our best size is in the backfield though, not on the line."

Heading the Raiders attack are quarterback Scott Shirley, and backs Roger Yost and Craig Ross — all seasoned starters.

"Yost could be tough to stop if he gets going," Rick noted. "The best thing about this team is their good attitude and excellent discipline."

Kunkle is getting a slow start because he was hired just two weeks ago. However, he quickly noted a few tough performers who'll snatch starting roles.

Fifteen lettermen return, but much of the 39-man squad consists of underclassmen. But with a low number of key injuries, Columbia should continue its current two-year trend of playing winning football.

Kunkle is assisted by Tom Fragasse, Jim Waldecker. Chuck Rimer and Ed Bak.

Four plays later. Roger Yost scored from one yard out to give the Raiders a temporary lead.



The wrestling started with 98 pounder Dan Manning of Beloit West Branch soundly defeating Mark Horner of Bedford Chanel. 16-1. Six and one half hours. and 166 matches later. Elyria Catholic's heavyweight Ed Szabo squaked by Pat Kennedy of Akron Hoban, 4-2.

LAST NIGHT'S wrestling saw only four of the area's 24 grapplers eliminated from the tournament: Oberlin's Eric Howard at 98. Brookside's Dave Gonzalez at 119. Elyria Catholic's 185 pounder Bob Smith, and Heavyweight Dennis Kane of Olmsted Falls. Every other area wrestler is still potentially a State qualifier, depending on the outcome of today's afternoon matches.

Anything can and does hap-

pen in tournament wrestling. Last year's defending state champ at 105. Dave Fischer of Beachwood, lost his first match of the season in the second round. Although still in the running for a possible third place, his defeat shows that no one is safe.

Almost one-third of this area's grapplers were double winners last night, and it's very possible some of them may be District Champions. At 98 pounds, Mark Allison of Olmsted Falls is in contention by virtue of a 24-0 superior decision and a first period pin. Earle's full swing sparks Meteors

— Midpark senior Megan Earle
needed a new offensive approach after failing to bunt in
her first two at-bats against
Normandy during last Thursday's Division I sectional
championship.

She decided to swing away in the seventh inning.

Good decision.

Earle's leadoff bloop down the right field line was misplayed into a three-base error and she would score two batters later on senior Caity Shirk's sacrifice fly to right.

Shirk's RBI gave the Meteors a lead they would never relinquish and Earle's run was the first of six Midpark would score in the inning on its way to a 7-1 win over the Invaders.

"I was just trying to put the ball in play somewhere," Earle said. "I knew I had to try and get a hit because I couldn't bunt the whole game."

With the win, Midpark advances to this afternoon's district semifinal against North Royalton/Garfield Heights at Day Park in Parma. The first pitch is set for 4:30 p.m.

Normandy did take a 1-0 lead in the second when Christina Schultz doubled home Ashley Lombardo. The Meteors, though, answered in the third when Michelle Knowles' single scored Shirk.

The teams would remain deadlocked in the 1-1 tie heading into the seventh inning because of the solid pitching performances of Midpark's Al Zelaski and Joy Foreman of Normandy.

Zelaski, who earned her 14th win on the mound, struck out five and at one point retired 13

straight batters. She also worked out of a one-out jam in the sixth. With a runner on second, third baseman Jessica Burgess snared a line drive and the inning ended on a fly ball to Earle in center field.

"I knew they liked to swing at high pitches and I tried to keep the ball inside because they liked to crowd the plate," Zelaski said of her strategy against the Invaders. "I just wanted to mix up my pitches and I felt I could be effective if I did that."

Normandy coach Bridget Zywiec praised the performance of Foreman, who also used a variety of pitches to strike out six, in addition to working out of a two-on, two-out jam in the sixth by getting Zelaski to pop out to third baseman Kristi Sambor.

"Joy's always done her job and she throws the ball where she's supposed to," Zywiec said. "Her record does not reflect the talent and skill she has."

In the seventh, following Earle's run on Shirk's sacrifice fly, the Meteors tacked on five more runs, with Maria Putrino, Tricia Balicky, Knowles, Michelle Fritz and Burgess all scoring in the frame.

"We have a good hitting team and that's important when you're playing a quality team like Normandy," Midpark coach Tom Balicky said.

For Zywiec, though, she said the game was one of missed opportunities for her team. "We had numerous chances with runners in scoring position and we hit the ball hard. We just hit it right at people."

Experienced players, and new coach look to mesh Wooster volleyball into league contender

In some sense, the 2007 season will mark a new era for College of Wooster volleyball due to a coaching change at the top, however in another, it should be business as usual for the Fighting Scots as an experienced group will aim for a 20-win season again and to be one of the North Coast Athletic Conference's top teams.

First-year mentor Sarah Davis is taking over a program that produced 20-win seasons in 2004 (21-9) and 2005 (25-7), and may have had another last fall had it not been for a key injury. Wooster appeared to be on its way to securing a spot in the four-team NCAC Tournament for the third year in a row at 4-2 in the league, but didn't make the tourney, only winning six total matches following that setback to finish 14-16 overall and 8-8 in the NCAC.

Carolyn Ciriegio, a second-team all-NCAC performer as a sophomore, is now healthy and flanked by fellow seniors Heather Wolff and Erin Wright, who have come back to the squad after being part of those 2004 and 2005 teams. Ciriegio was averaging 3.34 kills on a .246 attack percentage and 2.90 digs from her outside hitter position before suffering the knee injury, similar to her sophomore numbers (3.82 kpg, .273 attack pct., 4.62 dpg).

Wolff's return could be significant as the setter was on the All-NCAC Team her previous two seasons, earning second-team recognition in 2004 and honorable mention in 2005. Wolff will look to pick up where she left off, setting a College record for assists (1,501) and assists per game (13.17) as a sophomore, to go with 2.30 digs per game. Wright also is a welcome addition, as the 5-foot-11 middle hitter should contend for considerable action.

The Scots also have three juniors who are returning letterwinners in Ali Drushal, Abbie Casey, and Megan Earle. Drushal, who prepped at West Holmes High School, will likely anchor the team's defense after leading the league with 8.22 digs per game and racking up a school-record 888 total en route to NCAC Libero-of-the-Year honors in 2006. She's already just 721 digs away from breaking Wooster's career record in that category.

Casey is making the transition back to her more natural position of right-side hitter after serving as the setter, averaging 10.98 assists last fall, while Earle looks to continue to make her presence felt as both a defensive specialist and outside hitter.

Two other key players will be sophomores KateLynn Riley and Sarah Lorch. Riley, a hitter, was coming on strong at the end of her first year, ending up at 2.87 kills per game on a .203 attack percentage, while Lorch will be a factor, too, competing for playing time at middle hitter and right-side.

Overall, Davis, who has four other players on the roster, including two freshmen, is aiming to build on the Scots' tradition, and although still getting familiar with the personnel, she thinks this squad is capable of another winning season.

"It will be a lot of fun gelling the returning players, led by the seniors with loads of experience, and the incoming players, and get the entire group headed in the same direction," she said. "Our program wants to build off the past success of coach (Terri) Mason while working toward an NCAC title and an NCAA bid."

Wooster spikers go 1-3 at Kilt Classic

The College of Wooster volleyball team took home fifth-place honors at during the sixth Annual Kilt Classic on Saturday afternoon in Timken Gymnasium. The Fighting Scots finished 1-3 on the weekend, picking up their lone victory during Friday night's second session of play.

Mt. Union College won the tournament's championship going 4-0 during Friday and Saturday's action, while fellow Ohio Athletic Conference school Muskingum College took the runner-up honors with a 3-1 mark. Alma College ended with a 2-2 mark and took third by virtue of a 3-0 victory on Saturday over Carnegie Mellon University, who also finished 2-2. Westminster College finished play with an 0-4 record.

Action began on Friday night with the host Scots taking on Alma. Alma took the first game of the match, winning by 30-28 and 30-23 scores. Wooster fought back and took game three by a 30-23 count. Alma ended the home team's chance at a comeback with a 30-21 win in game four.

Wooster rebounded during its second match of the night, taking game one easily over Westminster, 30-17. Game two saw the Titans get some revenge, winning by a score of 31-29. Wooster answered back and took the final two games by a tally of 30-25 and 30-19. The Scots' offensive attack was led by Megan Earle with 28 kills in 53 attempts with six errors for a .415 hitting percentage.

The Fighting Scots would next face-off against Mt. Union in Saturday morning's play. The Purple Raiders came out of the gates, winning the first two games by 30-9 and 30-17 tallies. Wooster, however, would answer the call and dug deep, winning game three, 30-26, before Mt. Union claimed the victory with a 30-16 victory in game four.

In its final match of the weekend, the Scots fell to Muskingum in four games, dropping the first by a 30-23 score before coming back to take game two, 30-21. Game three was a nail biter, with the Muskies narrowly escaping with a 31-29 win. Wooster hung tough in game four, as Muskingum was victorious 30-24.

Leading the way for the Scots during the weekend was defensive ace Ali Drushal racking up 142 digs from her libero position. She added five service aces and earned herself a spot on the all-tournament team.

Earle led Wooster in kills (63), while Erin Wright posted the team-high in blocks and added 46 kills. KateLynn Riley gave the Scots' offense a boost with 53 kills on the weekend.

Senior setter Heather Wolff paced the offense with 11.50 assists per game during the two days of action to go with 18 kills, five service aces, and 37 digs.

The win moved the Terriers into Saturday's title match against No. 1 seed Wittenberg, the 2007 NCAC regular season champion and the top-ranked team in all of NCAA Division III. Hiram, which lost twice during the regular season to Wittenberg after upsetting the Tigers on their home floor a year ago, improved to 27-4 overall after posting a 12-2 record in the NCAC. Wooster closed out its season with records of 15-14 overall and 10-4 in the conference.

WOOSTER, Ohio - The College of Wooster tallied a pair of non-conference victories Friday evening during its 2008 homeopening matches inside Timken Gymnasium as part of a tri-match with Otterbein College and Ursuline College. With the two wins, the Fighting Scots improve their record to 4-6 overall.

Looking to utilize home-floor advantage for the first time, the Scots came out with a purpose in its two matches on Friday, winning each in convincing fashion. Malone (15-7) battled the Scots for three grueling sets after the Pioneers had downed Kenyon in straight sets (25-7, 25-13, 25-16) in the day's second match. Malone came right back and delivered the points needed to knock out Wooster, beating the hosts in three (25-17, 28-26, 25-20). Wooster Swept In Highly Competitive Tri-Match, Beal Records Rare Triple-Double

WOOSTER, Ohio - After defeating Earlham College in straight sets on Friday night, The College of Wooster volleyball team saw itself get swept by North Coast Athletic Conference foe and No. 5-ranked Wittenberg University 25-14, 25-22, 25-18 Saturday in the opener of a highly competitive tri-match inside Timken Gymnasium. Wooster went on to drop its second match of the day to Heidelberg College 27-29, 25-13, 25-15, 25-14.

During the tough loss to Heidelberg, Wooster freshman setter Lizzi Beal recorded what is believed to be the first tripledouble since Trisha Wiles accomplished the rare feat back in 1999. Against the Student Princes, Beal pounded down 10 kills, dished out 29 assists, and dug up 10 would-be Heidelberg kill attempts.

The Scots (14-12, 8-3 NCAC) began the first game with Wittenberg clinging to a 7-6 lead, before the visiting Tigers began a surge that would last throughout the end of the set. During the second set, the Scots possessed a slim 22-21 lead in a set that featured short runs by both sides. However, the Tigers rattled off the final 4-0 run and took set two, 25-22. In the third and final set, Wittenberg held a 17-16 advantage. Thanks to runs of 5-1 and 3-1, the visitors took the set and the match.

KateLynn Riley led the Scots pounding down 10 kills and recording three block solos and a block assist. Megan Earle finished with four kills and seven digs, and Ali Drushal recorded 18 digs. Beal ended the match with 19 assists.

The match against Heidelberg (23-5) was a different scenario, with the Scots and the Student Princes trading leads the entire match. There were several instances in which both teams found themselves in rallies lasting several minutes. It was the Scots, though, that would break through first, taking the opening set. However, Heidelberg stormed back and took the final three sets for the non-conference victory.

Riley led the Scots with a team-high 15 kills, and now stands at 974 kills over her three-year career, while Earle and Beal also added 10 kills apiece. Earle chipped in defensively with 20 digs and Beal added her 10, while sophomores Abby Jensen and Amanda Gottesman nearly hit double figures with nine digs each.

Beal completed her triple-double with 29 assists, while Drushal paced the defense with 34 digs.

The Scots will look to rebound when they travel to Meadville, Pa. and take on NCAC rival Allegheny College (13-12, 9-2 NCAC) in a battle for second place in the conference on Tuesday at 7 p.m.

Riley Reaches Milestone, Scots Move Into Second in Comeback Thriller

Junior hitter KateLynn Riley became the sixth player in school history to reach the 1,000-kill mark for her career on Tuesday night, and helped The College of Wooster volleyball team comeback from a two-set deficit against North Coast Athletic Conference foe Allegheny College inside the David V. Wise Center in Meadville, Pa. for a 3-2 win. With the victory, Wooster sweeps the season series with the Gators, each coming in five sets, and takes over sole possession of second place in the conference with a 9-3 record.

Wooster dropped the first two sets of the match 25-18 and 25-16. However, the visiting Scots dug out of that hole, and took sets three (25-18), four (25-12), and five (15-13) in convincing fashion for the come-from-behind key conference win.

Riley posted a career-high 29 kills, including nine in the decisive fifth set, with just six errors in 64 attempts on Tuesday, giving her 374 this season and 1,003 for her career. She joins Tiffany Rice (1,750 kills from 2002-05), Erin Schaffner (1,362 kills from 2003-06), Mandy Rearick (1,238 kills from 1996-99), Erin Donnell (1,162 kills from 1999-2002), and Carrie Zuro (1,044 kills from 1993-96) as the only Wooster players to reach that level.

Riley's night wasn't finished there, with the third-year Scot tallying a team-best four service aces, and four total blocks, including a solo block.

Other individual highlights for the Scots included the play of freshman Kate Brady, who came off the bench in the final three sets to spark the Wooster offense, recording a career-high 10 kills with just two errors on 16 attempts for a .500 hitting percentage. Additionally, senior Megan Earle chipped in with eight kills to go along with 23 digs, and freshman Sarah Hawke contributed five kills.

Freshman setter Lizzi Beal handed out 50 assists, while senior libero Ali Drushal inched closer to the 3,000-dig milestone with a team-high 24 digs. The school's all-time leader in career digs, Drushal needs just 75 more digs to reach that mark.

Scots Sweep Denison For Win No. 20

WOOSTER, Ohio - The College of Wooster volleyball team posted its first 20-win season since 2005 by sweeping Denison University 25-20, 25-22, 25-17 in North Coast Athletic Conference action at Timken Gymnasium Saturday afternoon on Senior Day. The Fighting Scots move to 20-12 this fall and 13-3 in the NCAC, notching their first 20-victory season since the 2005 squad went 25-7.

Wooster put the pressure on the Big Red (10-18, 7-9 NCAC) early and often by connecting on 42 kills for a .301 hitting percentage. Junior KateLynn Riley led the way with 16 kills, while senior Megan Earle was also in double figures with 10 kills on 17 attempts with two errors for .471 hitting percentage. Additionally, freshmen Meredith Kiefer and Sarah Hawke each tallied four kills.

Freshman setter Lizzi Beal posted 35 assists, two kills and a service ace. With those 35 assists, Beal moves into fifth place on Wooster's all-time laurels for a single-season with 1,067.

Defensively, Ali Drushal and Earle led the team with 14 and 15 digs, respectively, while Riley recorded a block solo and three block assists. Also of note, Hawke finished with three block assists, while junior Sarah Lorch racked up three kills and three block assists.

Wooster, who enters the NCAC postseason tournament as the No. 2 seed while riding a six-match winning streak, will face No. 3 seed Hiram College, who the Scots split with this season, Friday evening at 8 p.m. or 30 minutes following the conclusion of the first match. The other semifinal will put No. 1 seed Wittenberg University against No. 4 seed Allegheny College.

Terriers End Scots' Season In NCAC Tourney Semifinals

Winners of 10 of its last 13 matches to finish out the regular season, The College of Wooster's volleyball team late-season run of momentum came to an end Friday evening for a second-straight season to Hiram College in the semifinals of the North Coast Athletic Conference Tournament inside the HPER Center in Springfield. The third set played out much like the opener with each side not able to pull away. With the set tied at 19-19, Hiram scored six of the final nine points for a 25-22 win.

Junior outside hitter KateLynn Riley paced the offensive attack for Wooster as she connected with a team- and match-high 13 kills, one solo block, three block assists and two service aces. Meredith Kiefer and Megan Earle contributed eight and six kills, respectively, while Kiefer added two block assists.

In the Wooster back row, senior libero Ali Drushal paced the team with 22 digs, while Earle racked up 11 digs and freshman setter Lizzi Beal passed out 28 assists and smacked two kills on just two attempts.

Hiram (19-17) moves on to the championship final where it will once again do battle with No. 5-ranked Wittenberg University (31-2) on Saturday at 2 p.m., as those two teams will meet in the conference tournament finals for the seventh-straight season. The Tigers swept Allegheny College 25-11, 25-14, 25-18 in Friday's other semifinal to put themselves in contention for their 11th tournament title in the last 12 years, as Hiram took home the tournament title back in 2006.

Scots Win Three Individual Awards, Four on All-NCAC Teams



CLEVELAND, Ohio – The College of Wooster collected three of the North Coast Athletic Conference's four individual awards, highlighted by senior Ali Drushal (Lakeville, Ohio / West Holmes) being named the NCAC Libero of the Year for the third-consecutive season as announced by league officials on Saturday in conjunction with the NCAC Tournament championship match. Joining Drushal on the all-league first team was junior middle hitter KateLynn Riley (Westlake, Ohio / Westlake), while senior outside hitter Megan Earle (Middleburg Hts., Ohio/Midpark) was tabbed an all-NCAC honorable mention recipient.

Freshman setter Lizzi Beal (Bowling Green, Ky./Greenwood) was selected the NCAC Newcomer of the Year and found a spot on the honorable mention squad, and head coach Sarah Davis picked up her first


NCAC Coach of the Year award. Drushal notched her third all-conference recognition in volleyball, earning her secondstraight spot on the first-team after a second-team laurel in 2006. Drushal registered 734 digs, leading the NCAC in digs per set (6.55). Over her four seasons in the back row for the Scots, she amassed a conference-record 3,043 digs, and became just the 10th player in the history of NCAA women's volleyball, regardless of division, to amass 3,000 or more career digs.

Riley solidified herself as one of the premier hitters in the NCAC, garnering her first career postseason conference honor. She was an all-around producer for the Scots, leading the league in kills (447), kills per set (3.85) total points (572.5), total points per set (4.94). Her 447 kills are the fourth-most in Wooster single-season history, giving her 1,076 kills headed into her senior season. In addition, Riley led the Wooster defense at the net, recording 38 solo blocks and 75 block assists for 0.97 blocks per set, the second-highest total in the league, and paced the Wooster service game tallying 50 service aces.


Stepping in right away to lead the Wooster offense, Beal dished out 1,095 assists, the fifth-highest total in single-season school history, for a 9.12 assist per set mark, the second-best mark in the league, while smacking down 101 kills on 301 attempts. Behind the service line, she was second on the team with 33 service aces along with racking up four solo blocks and 31 block assists at the net.

Concluding a solid all-around four-year stint, Earle was a force both offensively and defensively for Wooster. She finished second on the team with 268 kills, giving her 703 for her career. Earle was second on the squad with 476 digs and a 4.00 digs per set average, good for seventh in the league. A versatile player, she racked up 1,488 career digs, moving her into third-place in the Wooster laurels.




Megan Earle Program Cover Sep 12 2008
